MINISTER ARTICLE

I vividly remember one weekday in June when I went for a walk with my dog. The sky was overcast and the wind was gusting relentlessly which made the walk unpleasant. It was the kind of gust that forces a person to lean into the head wind in order to feel secure with their footing and not feel like you might get blown over if you stood tall. Our walks are usually most enjoyable and provide a time for me to hear the sounds of nature in the community while I watch with amusement how my dog enjoys being off leash and socializing with other dogs.

Depending on one's circumstance the wind can either be a help or a hindrance. For instance, a strong wind in your sails is helpful to move a boat forward. However, a strong wind is a hindrance for an outdoor wedding ceremony. With curiosity I searched the internet to find quotes about the wind, I came across this Chinese proverb: "When the winds of change blow, some people build walls and others build windmills". The winds of change refer to impermanence. Due to causes and conditions everything is in a state of continuous change. Continuous change is difficult for us to accept. When things are going well, we would like it to remain unchanged. We would like to be able to hold onto the energy and strength of our youth. However, this is only wishful thinking and does not reflect the reality of life. I think this is why some people build walls and others build windmills when the winds of change blow. A wall might be able to shelter us from uncertainty for a limited time but the reality is that change is continuous and if we can accept this then the opportunity for spiritual growth will develop.

In a short book titled "Zen lessons the art of leadership" translated by Thomas Cleary we find a short letter titled "Two Winds".

"Those acting as leaders are often seen to be unclear in their knowledge when involved in two conditions. Touched by two winds, they lose the substance of the teaching.

One of these conditions is unfavorable circumstances, in which most are touched by the wind of decline. The second condition is favorable circumstances, in which most are touched by the wind of gain. Once you are touched by these two winds, the breaths of joy and anger mix in your heart, and looks of depression and moodiness show in your face.

Only the wise can turn circumstances into methods of teaching, beautifully guiding the later generations. For example, when Master Langya went to Suzhou, he happened to receive donations amounting to over twenty thousand dollars in cash. He sent people to count it secretly, had money sent anonymously to monks in the city monasteries, and the same day provided a feast for the community.

Master Langya himself, meanwhile, made his preparations and left before dawn the next day. At dawn, the community realized he was gone. Some followed him to Changzhou and got to see him, returning after obtaining the benefit of the teaching.

Seeing Master Langya made people develop faith and plant the seeds of the Way more deeply. This is what is called turning circumstances into a way of teaching. This is quite different from those who steel religious rank for their own personal profit."

Our practice is to be aware of what we feel to be unfavorable and favorable circumstances and to not lose sight of the teachings that guide us towards understanding and kindness.

The Calgary Buddhist Temple was pleased to host **"Sleeping Tigers: The Asahi Baseball Story"** presented by Yusuke Hyogo of High Summitt Immigration

The film tells the story of the Asahi baseball team which became a symbol of the Japanese Canadian struggle for equality and respect, and despite being disbanded and interned, left a legacy of inspiration for future generations of all Canadians. This remarkable story is told with a combination of archival footage, interviews, and dramatic re-enactments.





KYOTO, JAPAN, MAY 2023



JSBTC members, family and friends from CBT(Calgary), Edmonton, Toronto, Hamilton, Winnipeg, Vancouver and Kelowna joined over two thousand delegates; as one of five World districts (Japan, Hawaii, Buddhist Churches of America, Jodo Shinshu Buddhist Temples of Canada, and South America) in Kyoto, Japan.

The events of May 7-12, 2023 commemorated Shinran Shonin's 850th Birth Anniversary, the Jodo Shinshu 800th Foundation Anniversary Kysan Hoyo, and the 17th World Buddhist Women's Convention in Kyoto, Japan.



Bishop Sensei Tatsuya Aoki from Vancouver, Sensei Yoshimichi Ouchi from Toronto and Sensei Naoki Hirano from Kelowna accompanied the JSBTC group. They also walked us to the Nishi Hongwanji Temple for the early morning 0600 services. As participants in Fellowship district entertainment, JSBTC group performed "Wonderful Canada" odori .



Susan Huntley from the Calgary Buddhist Temple represented Canada on a panel presentation with others form Japan, USA, Brazil, and Hawaii.

- Otani Mausoleum where Shinran Shonin's ashes are interred

- The National Treasure Museum holding a huge collection of Buddhist art.
