



MINISTER ARTICLE

I am reading a book about Zen Buddhist lessons which is derived from teachings of several great Zen masters of China. The chapters are based on private records, letters, and documents from the tenth to thirteenth century.

The Zen lesson I will be sharing with you today comes from a letter. I have not thought about a handwritten letter in many years, and it occurs to me that we seldom sit down to put pen to paper ever since computers and smartphones have become the media of choice to communicate with written words. Some of the letters translated in the book were found many years after the passing of the Zen master. Similarly, the letters of Eshinni were found many years after her passing, and they provided important insight into her life and her relationship to her spouse, Shinran Shonin.

I wonder if future generations will have the same opportunity to find letters since they will most likely be stored on a computer. With handwritten letters, if they were kept as a memory, they would have the possibility of being found after a person's passing. Will there be the same opportunity to find letters stored on a computer that requires a password to search its contents?

The Zen letter I would like to share with you this month is titled "Feelings" and was written by Master Caotang Qing:

"The fire that burns a meadow starts from a little flame; the river that erodes a mountain starts drop by drop. A little bit of water can be blocked by a load of earth, but when there is a lot of water it can uproot trees, dislodge boulders, and wash away hills. A little bit of fire can be extinguished by a cup of water, but when there is a lot of fire it burns cities, towns, and mountain forests.

Is it ever different with the water of love and attachment and the fire of hate and resentment?

When people of old governed their minds, they stopped their thoughts before they came up, stopped their feelings before they arose. Therefore, the energy they used was very little while the accomplishment they reaped was very great.

When feelings and nature are disturbing each other, and love and hatred mix and conflict, then in oneself it will harm one's life, and in relation to others it will harm their beings. How great is the peril, beyond salvation."

The symbolism of the fire in the letter rings true because of the summer fires that we continue to experience each year. We don't usually hear about the small fires in the province that are easily controlled but when the fires are out of control, it becomes a great concern. We want to be able to control and stop the unwholesome thoughts in our mind before they lead to words and actions that will ultimately result in suffering.



This feature-length documentary, made in 2003, tells the story of the Asahi baseball team. This team became a symbol of the Japanese Canadian struggle for equality and respect, and despite being disbanded and interned, left a legacy of inspiration for future generations of all Canadians.





This remarkable story is told with a combination of archival footage, interviews, and dramatic re-enactments.

Discussion to follow and then stick around to watch "Our Beloved Otera" from 2009 which is a tribute to the Raymond Buddhist Temple narrated by Reyko Nishiyama and Harry Sugimoto. It was the first Buddhist temple established in Alberta and functioned until 2006.


SUMMER BREAK
