



MINISTER ARTICLE

We are in the month of September which means that we will be experiencing the autumn equinox on September 23rd. A time when the daylight and the nighttime are equal. As Buddhists this time of year reminds us to reflect on ourselves, we reflect on the Buddha-Dharma and the tendencies of the ego-self.

The month of September also highlights "World Peace Day" which is celebrated around the world annually on September 21st. A time of year, which is devoted to maintaining and developing the ideals of peace. With the hope that humanity will observe a period of 24 hours with non-violence and consider peaceful resolutions.

One smoky day in August I was out for an afternoon walk and observed that the Rocky Mountains were not visible. Normally during the afternoon walk and when the conditions are right the Rocky Mountains provide a beautiful landscape to behold. Because the contour of the majestic mountains was not visible, I began to consider a more personal meaning of witnessing the veil of smoke obscure the Rocky Mountains. I began to reflect on how self-centeredness can obscure relationships and a life of gratitude. Like the veil of smoke that obscured the Rocky Mountains my self-centeredness and blind passions cloud my understanding of true reality.

At times relationships can be difficult and the Buddha-Dharma teaches us that such difficulties arise because of self-centeredness. Consider the words of Rennyo Shonin (1415-1499) the 8th head priest of the Jodo Shinshu Hongwanji Temple; "The faults of others are easy to see, but our own faults are difficult to recognize. If one sees that they have a fault, they must realize that the fault must be very grave indeed for them to recognize it themselves; thus, they must take steps to correct their fault. Because it is difficult for us to see many of our faults, we should listen to the advice of others."

May we find the time to reflect on the ego-self through the teachings of the Buddha-Dharma. May we always have the courage to work towards a peaceful resolution. May we hear and listen to the words of others to recognize our own faults and at the same time learn to be less critical of others.

Furoshiki is where art meets sustainability – using decorative fabrics to wrap gifts, packages, and for other purposes, the furoshiki offers an earth-friendly alternative. It has been used for hundreds of years for a great many uses. The Word "Furo" translates to "bath", and "shiki" means "to spread out". Originally, they were used to wrap up sacred and important items at temples or shrines, then later were adopted for carrying personal items to and from the public bathhouse. More recently, Furoshiki became very popular as a simple handbag, grocery bag, and especially, as a reusable gift wrapping!

JAPANESE CANADIAN LEGACIES UPDATES

The JC legacies has released more information about the Intergenerational Wellness stream opening up in September, as well as other information about other streams and the Monument database.

Background

On May 21, 2022, the BC Government made an historic announcement, marking a pivotal moment in our community, one that honours our elders past and present. A \$100 million dollar commitment was announced, reflecting funding to support the historical wrongs framework recommended by the National Association of Japanese Canadians BC Redress Project, in conjunction with Japanese Canadian communities in BC. The initiatives were developed from 2020 – 2022 and fit within six pillars: Monument; Education; Senior Health and Wellness; Community and Culture; Heritage Restoration; and Anti-racism.

Japanese Canadian Legacy Monument

The Monument pillar of Japanese Canadian Legacies is comprised of two components: the monument itself, and a database of names, which will be configured onto a monument wall. As a lasting legacy, a monument will be built close to the parliament buildings in the provincial capital of Victoria. A place of pilgrimage, reflection, remembrance and learning, the monument wall will frame the story of the uprooting, incarceration, internment, dispossession, and permanent displacement of the nearly 22,000 Japanese Canadians who lived in the coastal areas of BC. This project will be led by the BC Government jointly with the Japanese Canadian Legacies Society."

If you have not yet done so, please submit names of interned family to be included in the MONUMENT.

The Community Fund honours the legacies of Japanese Canadians in BC by providing grants in six project streams: community projects, arts, sports, infrastructure, and intergenerational wellness.

GARAGE SALE




